2021 Distinguished Alumni Awards Announced

The Edison Distinguished Alumni Award was first presented in 2010 to honor graduates for their personal achievements. The Edison Community & Sports Foundation is pleased to announce that Dr. Thomas D. Simpson and William “Bill” Volna have been named the 2021 Distinguished Alumni. Both recipients will be presented the award at the Niles Schulz Scholarship Dinner event planned to be held in October 2021. It is with great delight that we introduce our two most recent Distinguished Alumni. Congratulations to both gentlemen, truly Distinguished Alumni!



Doctor Thomas D. Simpson

Tom Simpson graduated from Edison in 1960 after which he attended the University of Minnesota graduating in 1964 with a degree in economics. Tom was awarded a Woodrow Wilson Foundation Fellowship and enrolled at the University of Chicago to pursue graduate studies. He graduated from the University of Chicago in 1970 earning a Doctorate in Economics. After graduate school, Tom began his career as a professor at Macalester College in St. Paul, MN where he rose to the position of Chairman of the Department of Economics. In 1976 Tom had the opportunity to join the Federal Reserve Board as a research economist in Washington, DC where he worked for 30 years advancing to become the senior advisor. Among many duties, Tom represented the Federal Reserve abroad in such international forums as the Organization for Economic Development and Cooperation, the Bank of International Settlements, and the International Monetary Fund. His expertise was sought by many nations and he provided technical assistance to countries in Europe, China, Africa and Central and South America throughout his career.

He considers several of his most fascinating experiences the time spent in Russia, after the breakup of the Soviet



William “Bill” Volna

Bill Volna graduated from Edison in 1949 and attended the University of Minnesota earning a degree in Mechanical Engineering. After serving in the Army, Bill began his career at Honeywell where he remained for 20 years. While at Honeywell, Bill quickly became known as an “Engineer’s engineer”. He worked on many projects including, the Country’s early space program, the Apollo space program and navigation systems for commercial aviation. Bill left Honeywell in 1968 and started the William M. Volna Engineering Company located in a building he and his father built on 18th and Quincy Street in Northeast, Minneapolis. Volna Engineering quickly and steadily gained a reputation for solving complex mechanical engineering problems. The company’s clients included his former employer Honeywell, the US Navy, Sperry, Lockheed, 3M, Wright Patterson Air Force base and many others. Bill was awarded multiple patents, both individually and in collaboration with others, across diverse disciplines and industries such as, solar energy technology, machine tool calibration, technology to protect the national power grid from electro-magnetic pulses, highway traffic control sensors and equipment to test computer chips. In 1984 he was invited by the government of Taiwan to mentor young engineers at the Chung Shan Institute of Science and Technology.

Union and Iraq where he had responsibility for establishing a viable currency. The fact that Tom was able to blend his economics background in both domestic and international arenas may very well be due to growing up in NE Minneapolis. Tom was intrigued by the variety of cultures in his NE neighborhood, a melting pot of sort, which influenced and contributed greatly to future professional success.

Tom retired from the Federal Reserve System in 2006 and accepted a teaching position with the Cameron School of Business at the University of North Carolina Wilmington. He is currently the Executive in Residence of Economics and Finance. Tom has published numerous articles in professional journals, made presentations at countless conferences and economic forums and writes a blog on the U.S. economy (www.ThomasDSimpson.com). Tom has also authored several books over his career. His most recent book published in 2020 is titled Capitalism Versus Socialism: What Does the Bible Have to Say?

Tom is a Christian who puts his faith into action. He is a faculty advisor to RATIO CHRISTI on campus and frequently hosts international students at his home. His hobbies include motorcycle riding, camping, boating, and baseball. He is happily married with six children and four grandchildren.

A passionate amateur astronomer, in 1985 Bill designed and built a portable, fully enclosed, climate-controlled observatory. His invention caused an immediate sensation in the astronomical community. Bill's new portable observatory won multiple first-place honors at the Stellafane Astronomy Convention in Springfield, Vermont, was a feature article in Sky & Telescope magazine and received recognition in numerous other astronomy books and professional journals. Bill's invention also caught the attention of astronomers at the National Science Foundation who in 1994 invited him to bring his portable observatory to the South Pole Scott-Amundson research station to help study meteorological conditions in Antarctica. Bill spent a month at the South Pole assisting researchers and was invited to return the following year for another month of research support.

Bill has lived in St Anthony Village since 1960 where he and his wife raised their family. Although retired, he spends almost every day at what he affectionately refers to as his "sandbox", the shop on Quincy Street, still providing design consulting to a variety of Minnesota-based technology start-ups. He has spent a lifetime applying the principles of mechanical engineering to solve problems, create value for his clients, and bring the stars closer to us through astronomy.

The Pete Guzy We Didn't Know, By Lowell Ludford

Edison alumni know or remember Pete Guzy as a legendary coach and mentor. But that's only half the story. The other half is that Guzy (1902-1986) was a legendary high school athlete. He was captain of the baseball team, the basketball team and co-captain of the football team.

Guzy was a natural athlete graduating in class of 1922 at the old East High School at Central and University Avenues. East closed at the end of the 1923 school year, replaced by Edison High School that opened in 1922, and Marshall University in Southeast Minneapolis.

World War I ended in fall of 1918. Spanish Flu was rampant in Minneapolis (people wore masks and public schools closed for a time) when Guzy, who lived on 5th St NE, began East High at 16 and took to athletics, finishing with 10 letters in baseball, basketball and football.

Baseball

Baseball was his best sport. He was captain of the East baseball team in 1920, 21 and 22 and led the East team to city championships in 1921 and 22. Guzy was primarily a pitcher, but also played outfield and sometimes first base. His batting average was over 300.

“Outstanding star” of the 1921 team, Guzy struck out 96 players in seven games. In the game against North, he struck out 20 players, and against West he struck out 17. In 1922, Guzy had an average strikeout record of 12 batters a game. Guzy is remembered for a “sensational play” he made in 1922 against North when he switched from pitcher to first base near the end of the 1-1 contest that was called because of rain. In the final play, Guzy “jumped fully three feet in the air” to catch a line drive in his gloved hand.

Interestingly, as Coach at Edison, Guzy insisted on being called Pete, but as a high school athlete he was known as

Peter Guzy. He was only about five foot seven and didn't weigh more than 125 pounds. Yet, he was a star basketball and football player in addition to baseball. As captain of the basketball team in 1922 he reportedly played a good game all season and led the field in free throws, making 31 out of a possible 50. He also was rated third in number of points scored.

Football

Guzy played quarterback on the East football teams, and was also the kicker. In 1921, when he was co-captain, there were four Minneapolis newspapers: the Journal, Tribune, Daily News and Daily Star. Each selected its own all-star city high school football team. Each newspaper named Guzy as its all-star team quarterback.

Edison won the city championship that year and the big game was with West, before a crowd of 8,000. The West team started out like easy victors, but East slowly began to push back. The second half started 0-0 and was hard fought. In the last quarter, East managed to bring the ball to the West 10-yard line in six downs. Then Guzy, the East quarterback, who had not yet taken the ball, went through center for a nine-yard gain. On the next play, Guzy took the ball again and plunged over the goal line, then kicked the extra point. East won 7-0 in the decisive game of the year that made them champions.



Guzy--Baseball Captain

University of Minnesota

After graduating from East High School, Guzy enrolled at the University of Minnesota where he lettered in football and baseball. When the old Memorial Stadium was dedicated on November 15, 1924, in a game against Illinois, Peter Guzy took the field as one of three Gopher quarterbacks. He only weighed 127 pounds and was the team's passer, playing left halfback on the few times the team passed, but he had a good record of completions. Guzy was a pitching sensation on the baseball team. He was an All-Big Ten pitcher in 1925 and served as captain of the team in 1926.

Guzy graduated from the University in 1928 and in the fall began coaching at Faribault, then switched to football and baseball coach at Superior, Wisconsin East High School in 1929, where one of his young players was Tuffy Leemans who later would become a famous Hall of Fame fullback and halfback who played for the New York Giants 1936-1943 and was named to the NFL All-Decade Team for the 1930s. When Leemans was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1978 he could have bestowed the honor of introducing him to any number of friends, players or coaches. Leemans gave the honor to his old Superior East High coach, Pete Guzy.



Guzy Strikes Out Babe Ruth

In 1935, Guzy left Superior East to become coach at Edison High School. He had been playing baseball summers in the Northern League but is best remembered for his performance on September 1, 1935 when he pitched for the Minneapolis Police team in the annual game with the St. Paul Police team at the old Nicollet baseball park. Visiting that day was the famous Babe Ruth, who played half the game with St. Paul and the other half with Minneapolis. Guzy was pitching when the Babe came to bat and Guzy struck him out in front of 13,000 fans. Pete Guzy struck out Babe Ruth, along with SEVENTEEN other batters that day!

Guzy went on to become the legendary Edison football and baseball coach, building on his earlier days, now long forgotten, as a legendary athlete at old East High School and at the University of Minnesota. Appropriately, the gridiron at Edison High School is named Pete Guzy Memorial Field in his honor.

Lowell Ludford was the Sports Editor of the Edison Record, Class of 1949. Information for this story came mostly from the pages of the East High School and University of Minnesota Yearbooks, 1920-1926, and from the Northeaster.

The book includes....






On 6.24.16 David Forster Jr. was on an evening training run when he collapsed and passed away 6 blocks from his home in NE Minneapolis. David was a proud Hopkins Royal and St. John's Johnnie, finding his passion for running as a member of the track and cross country teams at both schools.

He was an elite marathoner who had completed several races. Only a week before David passed he completed Grandma's, in which he helped his fiancée complete her first marathon.

It was running that also gave David countless life-long friends. David lived every day making an impact on others, albeit unintentionally, through listening, caring and then genuinely reacting and responding, one person, one heartfelt gesture at a time.

The Forster family established "Finish The Run", an annual 5 K run/2 mile walk in NE Minneapolis to honor David, to gather a community of people and to spread the message that we should all try to live our own lives with intention, and the kind of integrity, honesty, love, listening skills, etc. that David displayed, so subtly but completely, every day of his life.

The family donates all proceeds to organizations that connect to things David was passionate about. David loved running and embraced NE Minneapolis, and so the Forster family felt that dollars donated to the Edison High School track and cross country programs would be the perfect fit.
